This half-day program will describe the recent "state of the art" advances in the treatment of glenohumeral instability. A distinguished faculty will present their experience and techniques in diagnosing and treating patients with shoulder instability. Topics will include imaging techniques for identifying and quantifying glenohumeral bone loss, arthroscopic and open techniques for shoulder stabilization, and rehabilitation for patients following surgery. Technical pearls and pitfalls for avoiding complications will be discussed and treatment options for patients who have failed shoulder stabilization surgery will be reviewed.
